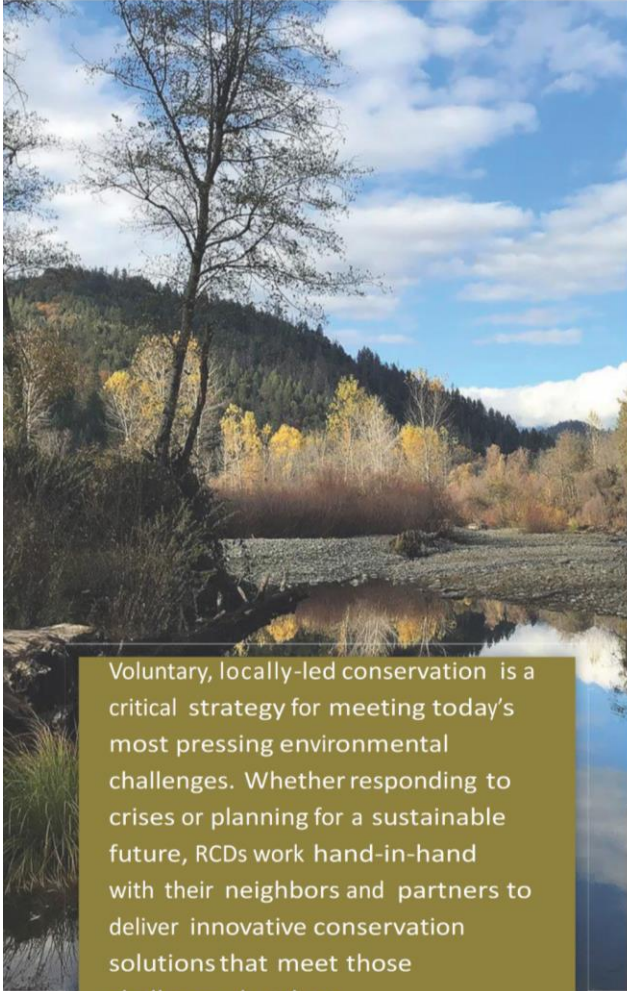
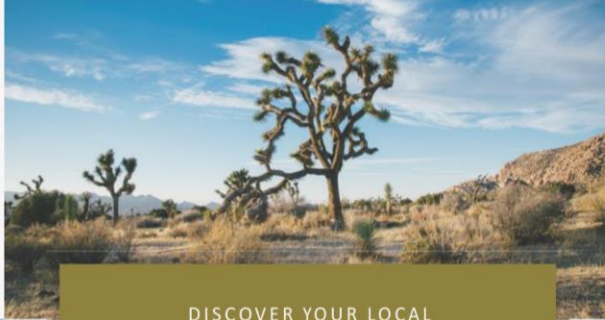


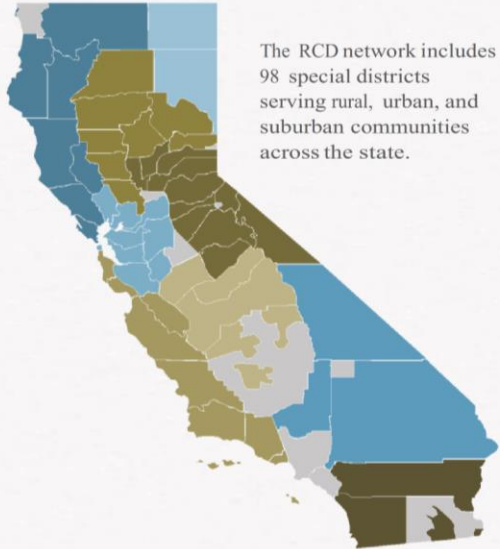

There is no resource more critical than water. That's why RCDs work to ensure safe and reliable water for people, farms, fish, and wildlife.

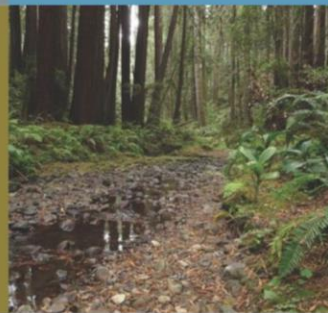
WHAT ARE Resource Conservation Districts?

Resource Conservation Districts (RCDs) are your partners in supporting local conservation and sustainable agriculture. We make conservation happen on-the-ground by partnering with local communities on a voluntary basis to care for California's land, water, soil, and other natural resources. We were designed to evolve with the changing needs of people and the land, to ensure that California is home to thriving and resilient communities, food systems, and economies.



CLIMATE RESILIENCE

Extremes like drought and wildfire affect all Californians. RCDs partner on local solutions to water scarcity, fire preparedness, and climate readiness.



Work We Do

Deeply rooted in California communities

RCDs have deep roots across California. RCDs were first founded after the Dust Bowl in the 1930s to bring federal and state funds and technical assistance to farmers and ranchers so that they could voluntarily conserve water, soil, and wildlife habitat on their land. Spanning many generations, RCDs have maintained deep connections to farmers and ranchers, and most have also evolved with the changing needs of California's diverse communities.

Our statewide network serves rural, urban, and suburban populations, and consists of conservation professionals and local experts committed to seeing our communities thrive.
